

17th – 18th DECEMBER 2020

On 17th December 2010 Mohamed Bouazizi, a Tunisian street vendor, self-immolated, triggering a wave of protests that spread across North Africa and the Middle East in what became known as the Arab Uprisings. The ensuing protests toppled rulers in Egypt, Tunisia, Yemen and Libya, opened new spaces of popular contestation, and shook both relations between rulers and ruled and the very foundations of states across the region.

While counter revolutionary processes aided regime survival in Bahrain and Syria, the memory of protests continues to resonate amongst those challenging Assad and Al Khalifa rule. In the years that followed, protests also broke out across Iraq, Lebanon, Sudan, Turkey, Algeria and Iran, prompting some to refer to an 'Arab Spring 2.0' but which is perhaps best viewed as an on-going struggle for people to meet their basic needs and assert basic rights amidst often precarious conditions and the entrenchment of authoritarian rule.

As we approach the 10th anniversary of Bouazizi's death, this SEPAD online conference reflects on the legacy of Bouazizi's act and the ensuing struggles that followed. We seek to reflect on the ways in which the uprisings have affected people and political projects across the Middle East and North Africa.
